
NEWS FROM ASHBOURNE GROUP OF CHURCHES

December readings notes

December 1st Advent

Jeremiah 33:14-16 Although the Jews were living under the threat of attack from the Babylonians, Jeremiah reassures them that God will appoint a king, a descendant of King David, to rule in accordance with God's righteous nature.

Luke 21:25-26 Jesus said to his disciples

The later books of the Old Testament warned the Jews that the coming of God's rule on earth would be preceded by calamities and by fear. The figure of the 'Son of Man' as foretold by Daniel (Dan.7;13-14) would then appear in glory. The people must be ready, and prepared for his coming.

December 8th Advent 2

Malachi 3:1-4 In the last book of the Old Testament, Malachi warns that God is his messenger who will cleanse the nation so that the people would be ready to present their offerings at the time when God would rule over them.

Thus says the Lord God

Luke 3:1-6

When he began to write his Gospel, Luke carefully set out the historical background for Jesus's ministry. He reminded his readers that the work of John the Baptist had been foretold in the Old Testament and quoted the passage in which Isaiah had reassured the exiled Jews of his day that they must prepare a royal road along which God would come to their aid.

December 15th Advent 3

Zephaniah 3:14-20 Zephaniah prophesied in the days when the Jews were living under the threat of invasion by the Assyrians. He assured them that when they repented, God would come again in their midst and rescue them.

Luke 3:7-18

Matthew and Luke offer quite a detailed account of the ministry of John the Baptist and the reactions of different members of Jewish society to his message. The baptism he offered to those who came to hear him, was not common practise amongst the Jews except as an initiation rite into some small groups like the Essenes, who lived an ascetic life in the area of the Dead Sea. Spoke spoke to them of the coming of Jesus who would baptise with the Holy Spirit and fire, a symbol of the might and the cleansing power of God.

December 22nd Advent 4

Micah 5:2-5a The insignificant village of Bethlehem where the great King David had been born, is to become the birthplace of the new ruler who would be a true shepherd to God's people, bringing them peace and security.

The Lord says to his people

Luke1:39-45

After Mary received the message from Gabriel that she would bear a son, she left Nazareth to visit her cousin, Elizabeth who lived near near Jerusalem. Like Mary, Elizabeth's pregnancy was unexpected since she was past the age of child bearing. Elizabeth recognised the significance of the two coming births which mirrored similar events in the Old Testament, like Isaac's birth to the old couple, Abraham and Sarah. (Gen. 18:9-14)

December 24th Christmas Eve

Isaiah 52:7-10 In the midst of the horrors of exile in Babylon, the prophet reassures the Jews that God's messenger will come with the news that God will comfort his people and redeem Jerusalem. All nations will see God's saving acts.

John 1:1-14

The prologue to John's gospel is unique among the gospels. John introduces some of the major themes which he develops as he recounts the mission and ministry of Jesus. God's Word was creative and a source of light and life. John the Baptist came to bear witness, but the Word would be rejected. Those who believed in him would see the fulness of his glory.

December 25th Christmas Day

Isaiah 9:2-7 In days of political uncertainty Isaiah reassures the people that despite the darkness of their lives, God will send a new ruler with a new name, a descendant of King David. He will bring peace and justice to the land.

Luke 2:1-14

It was important to the gospel writers that Jesus had been born in Bethlehem the home of King David, not Nazareth, his family's home. This fulfilled the promises of the prophets. Luke's concern for the poor and those who lived on the edges of society is evident in his account of the coming of the shepherds as the first visitors to the new born child.

December 29th Naming and circumcision

Numbers 6:22-27 The book of Numbers offers an account of the years the Hebrews spent wandering through the wilderness under Moses' leadership. This lovely blessing was to be pronounced by Aaron, Moses' brother, over the people, bestowing God's favour and peace on them.

Luke 2:15-21

After receiving the message of Jesus' birth from heavenly messengers, the shepherds rushed to Bethlehem, where, despite their lowly position in society, they spread the news with delight. After eight days, Jesus was initiated into the Jewish faith and given his new name, 'Jesus': in Hebrew,' Joshua', which means 'God saves'.


On Saturday 18th May, seven teams journeyed to Ranmoor representing the following Churches/Guilds: Beeston. Derby. Leicester. Nottingham. Sheffield. York – Two teams, Seniors and Juniors.

The W. W. Worthington Memorial Trophy

This trophy was first awarded in June 1978, the winning team being the Leicester Diocesan Guild. It was given by the Worthington family who were brewers in Burton on Trent and members of St Paul's Church in Burton. The trophy is awarded on an annual basis to "The Best Church 10 Bell Ringing Team".

Initially the contests were always held at St. Paul's but they now move around the Midlands area and this year 2024, St. John the Evangelist, Ranmoor, Sheffield was the venue. They have a fine ring of bells cast by Gillett and Johnston in 1934, the heaviest bell (the Tenor) being 16 cwt (750kg).

The competition piece was a course of Yorkshire Surprise Royal which is 360 changes taking about 13 mins to ring. The winners were the Derby Diocesan Guild. The Trophy, a Rosebowl, is now on show in St. Oswald's Church exhibition cabinet along with other ringing items which illustrate the various aspects of Church bell ringing. This is possible because one of St. Oswald's band, Peter Dickinson, was in the ringing team so we have the Rosebowl here for 5 weeks during November/December. PWD

Stamps for USPG at Christmas.

Christmas is approaching and once again we are collecting stamps in support of the work of USPG. There's a box by the door in the South transept of St. Oswald's church,

This year, USPG have been helping the Diocese of Dhaka in Bangladesh to develop eleven clinics for mothers and children in areas where there are few hospitals, means of transport are very limited, and it is hard to make contact with trained medical staff. The lives of pregnant women and their babies are at risk, so the clinics are vital ensuring dependable care in both maternal and child health.



The stamp dealers' guidelines remain as follows: pre 2008 stamps are seldom valuable no stamps that are printed on an envelope the margins of envelopes round the stamps should be about 1centimetre which allows the people who handle them space to hold the stamp more easily - this is harder to achieve with our bigger stamps, but please try!
